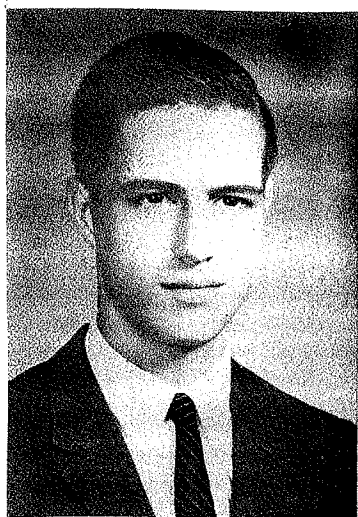


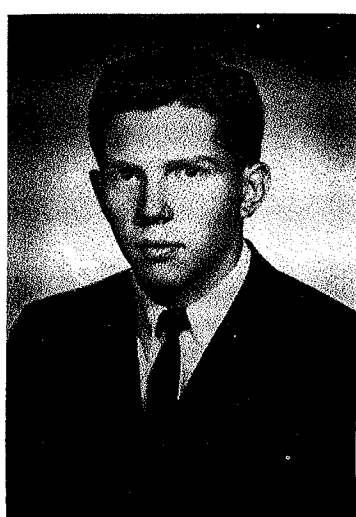

Through living with an American family I had the opportunity to participate in the various family activities and could find out everything about American life that to me seems a little more relaxed in many ways and often much less formal. Rocky River High School gave me an excellent example of a good school and school spirit and cooperation I will always associate with it.

I want to thank everybody in the school for their help and understanding to make my stay in Rocky River a success.

Coach Vincent Gandolfi was the first to speak. He praised his freshman baseball team for their excellent record and introduced the members of his squad.

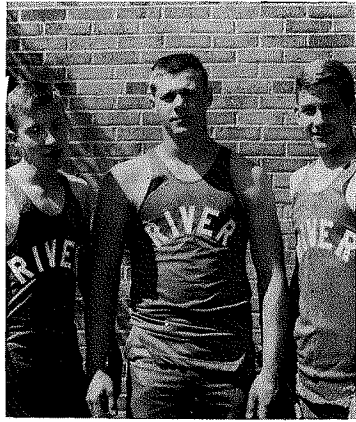
Next, the varsity baseball team was complimented for its good character and hard work by its coach, Mr. Donald Kelly. Coach Kelly announced the

Mr. Quinton Morris, the coach of the golf team, introduced his squad and explained the scoring system used in its matches. He awarded letters to the four lettermen.

Following Mr. Morris was Mr. David Bichsel, coach of the freshman track team.

Coach Frail gave the record of the varsity track squad and thanked the faculty and student body for supporting the team. He then awarded the 16 varsity lettermen.

Freshmen Win Four Straight; Three New Records Set

The freshman track team, under Coach David Bichsel, failing to be disheartened by two opening losses, made a tremendous comeback to win their last four meets and finish with a 4-2 mark.

In late season games, North Olmsted and Avon Lake, Lakewood and Collinwood, and Avon Lake were defeated. Lakewood's loss was only its second in two years.

New records established during this 1962 season were scored in three events.

Tom George first broke the freshman 880 yard run record of 2:15.1 by Fred Thomas in 1960 by cutting the time down to 2:14. In the last meet this year, he progressed to break

his own time, pulling it down to 2:13.4.

Gordon Stofer broke a record of 9'8" attained by Bill Napier and Dennis Carter in 1956 and 1958 respectively. Stofer vaulted an even ten feet.

The shot put record set by Jack Nordstrom of 49'2" in 1961 was also broken as Dave Kergaard threw the shot a distance of 54'2".

Frosh End 9-3 Season

Ending their 1962 season, the freshman baseball squad held a record of nine wins and three losses. Coach Vince Gandolfi was handed the .750 average as he finished his final coaching episode at RRHS.

Cindermen Close With District Fourth

River closed their 1962 track season, May 19, by finishing sixth of 16 schools in the District Track Meet at Elyria. The final team record showed one win in 14 meets, including a fourth place finish in the conference. The season was Mr. Donald Frail's tenth and last as head track coach. He will take the football leadership next fall.

At Elyria, Olmsted Falls won with 34 1/2 points, followed by Elyria, North Olmsted, Lorain, Lorain Admiral King,

then River with 17 points. River's mile relay team of Pat Gillespie, Dave Dickson, Dick Sternberg, and Eric Maurer was victorious, and earned a spot in the State Meet, where they failed to place the following week.

Of the 55 boys who completed the season, 18 received letters. Sixteen earned their letters by averaging at least one point in the 14 meets. These included four sophomores, six juniors, and six seniors. A three-year award and a manager's letter were also given.

Pat Gillespie, second to Jim Weston last year, was top individual scorer with a 20-point

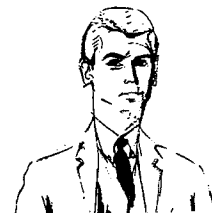
